We hear a lot of concerns about parking in Independence.

Parking is complex. Everyone likes a convenient place to park. But there are some considerations that often are overlooked.

These considerations include the facts that:

- 1. Land is limited, and land for parking often displaces or spreads out land for buildings. If we seek abundant parking, especially in downtown, it will spread out our downtown.
- 2. Providing free parking costs money. The provision of park-

ing is not free, regardless of who constructs the spaces. City staff recently conducted a study of a property sold in Independence and found that purchasing and constructing a surface parking lot on the land would cost approximately \$12,000 per spot. If a private developer develops the property and some parking, they will incur a similar cost per spot, but will fold it into the overall cost of the project, driving up future rents. Like a "free lunch," there is no such thing as a "free parking spot."

Studying the issue has shown us the complexity of parking. The Planning Commission will study the issue further over the coming year. We would love to hear your thoughts about how best to proceed. The Planning Commission meets the first Monday of every month at 7:00 pm. SANDBAG STATION

Should we experience a high water/flooding event, our Public Works Department has created a sandbag station with bags, sand and shovels at the northeast corner of the Independence Cinema parking lot.

You may use the supplies provided for emergency purposes to protect your property from a high water event.

FREEZING WEATHER TIPS

Here are a few basic tips for preparing for or recovering from freezing weather:

- Insulate pipes that may be vulnerable to the cold, or that have caused problems before.
- Open cabinet doors to expose pipes to warmer room temperatures.
- Crack open a faucet the farthest away from the place where your water enters the house.
 Running water even a trickle helps prevent pipes from freezing because the temperature of running water is above the freezing level.
- Much of your plumbing is located in the crawl space under your home—be sure the foundation vents are closed. Replacement styrofoam inserts can be purchased from most hardware stores/hardware departments.
- Keep your water meter box lid closed to help keep the meter from freezing. Report broken or missing lids by calling 503-838-1212.
- Remove, drain and store your garden hoses. Wrap or cover the spigots.
- Keep your thermostat set to the same temperature day and night. Keeping your house a little warmer at night may increase your heating bill, but it will help avoid costly repairs due to a burst pipe.
- Keep your garage doors closed, especially if there are water supply lines inside (to a water heater or washing machine, for example).
- DON'T use your oven to heat your home. The same is true for a charcoal or wood barbecue—the smoke contains carbon monoxide and can be fatal.
- If you plan an extended vacation during cold weather, call City Hall (503-838-1212) to have the water meter turned off. Then, drain your water pipes and turn off your water heater and other water-using devices.
