Local Option Levy for Library, Museum & Parks



The city of Independence is seeking a five-year local option tax of \$1.82 per \$1,000 of assessed value, beginning fiscal year 2025-26, to support operations and maintenance of the City's museum, library, and parks. The levy is necessary to continue to operate and maintain the Heritage Museum, public library, and city parks for the next five years.

Oregon's Story Begins Here

If approved, the levy would support continued operation and maintenance of the Heritage Museum, Independence Public library, and city parks for the next five years, ensuring that current service levels are maintained.

The Library, Museum, and Parks are funded through June 30, 2025. If the levy does not pass, city staff will evaluate options and make recommendations to the Council, which may include:

- Reduced Services: This could involve shorter service hours at the Library and Museum, potentially leading to staff reductions at one or both facilities.
- Facility Closures: The Museum and/or Library may close, which would result in staff reductions at one or both locations.
- Maintenance Cuts and/or Closures: Reduced maintenance across all parks with possible closure of less frequently used parks.

The proposed rate will raise approximately \$1,123,000, \$1,156,000, \$1,191,000, \$1,227,000, and \$1,264,000 over the five fiscal years, respectively.

Over the last year, the city of Independence has worked to understand individuals' downtown parking experience and how they would like it to improve in the future.

The city of Independence received a Transportation and Growth Management grant to help study the parking situation, offer an opportunity to have a community conversation about parking in downtown, and determine how best to navigate the inherent tension between a compact/walkable area and the provision of parking.

New Interpretive Panels Detail Independence's History



The Trustees of the Braemar Charitable Trust generously awarded a \$10,000 grant to the Heritage Museum in 2021 to support the design, fabrication, and installation of five interpretive panels within the Independence Historical District. This project aimed to enrich the community's understanding of local history by providing detailed insights into buildings that either no longer exist or have since been repurposed from their original use.

The panels were researched and designed by the museum's curator, Amy Christensen, whose expertise ensured the accuracy and depth of the content. Thanks to the grant, the entire cost of the project, including the museum staff's time and resources, was fully covered.

To further support the local economy, the museum partnered with a local fabricator to create the sturdy stands for the panels, while a nearby sign shop was entrusted with the task of printing the metal signs. These collaborations not only brought the project to life but also underscored the museum's commitment to working with the community.

The panels offer visitors a unique glimpse into the evolving history of Independence by telling the stories of significant structures that either disappeared or found new purposes over time, preserving their legacy for future generations.

The five free-standing panels highlight:

- Former City Hall
- Dome Building
- Pioneer Park
- Hop Warehouse
- Chinese Laundry

Public Works Team Cleans Up Ash Creek at Pioneer Park



It's amazing what you can fish out of a creek—spoiler alert, it's not always fish!

Last week, members of our public works crew teamed up with the Luckiamute Watershed Council and the Ash Creek Water Control District to clean a section of Ash Creek next to Pioneer Park. Residents alerted the city about trash,

pollutants, and other debris in the creek, highlighting the need for a collaborative solution. In response, the city reached out to the Luckiamute Watershed Council for assistance, prioritizing the preservation of the creek's natural integrity. The team successfully hauled out an impressive amount of trash, including plastic, remnants of a railroad trestle, and a surprising amount of tires—all of which pose significant threats to the surrounding wildlife.

Pioneer Park, known as Independence's first park, was included in the original town plat back in the 1800s. Nestled at the corner of Seventh and C streets, the park sits at the confluence of the South Fork and Main Stem of Ash Creek and features an intact native riparian zone.


